

## Breeding Bird Atlas Notes by Carol Thompson, Iowa City

The Breeding Bird Atlas committee met this January and reviewed progress and made some decisions on how to proceed. It was an optimistic meeting; as one committee member put it "I think we're actually going to be able to finish this." At present we are compiling and reviewing all of the data and the hope is that this will be complete by May. HOWEVER, there are a few of you out there that still have not turned your cards in. We need them now!

In other news, we are looking for artwork for the publication. We have decided to include black-and-white line drawings of each of the nesting species. We are actively soliciting artists who might be interested in working on some of the drawings. This is your chance to get some recognition for your work. As you can imagine, we do not have a very large fund for this although we are currently seeking more funding. We will be able to pay for some drawings; we would hope that we might get some of the artwork as a donation. If you are interested, please send a copy of a sketch or two, how much you would charge for your work, and what species you would be interested in working on.

We need coverage of all of our breeding birds, especially some of the less common species. The sketches should be small, no more than 5x5 inches and should be relatively simple; no elaborate backgrounds. Send submissions to Laura Jackson, DNR, Wildlife Research Station, Boone, Iowa 50036. One further item, we obviously need money to pay for the publication. We hope to raise enough money to not only cover the expenses involved in production, but also to offset some of the publishing costs thereby making the final product more affordable. ### **Research on Iowa Birds**

With the settlement of Iowa in the 1800s, perhaps no natural habitat has been so altered as have its wetlands. More than 95% of the wetlands that originally were found in Iowa have been drained or filled in. Recently, several agencies have tried to reverse this trend by restoring Iowa wetlands. Usually this is done by breaking the drainage tile so the wetland basin will refill with rainwater and melted snow. Recently, several graduate students at Iowa State have been studying restored wetlands to try to see how these are being used by various wildlife.

One of these students is Lisa Hemesath who is currently completing a masters degree in Animal Ecology at Iowa State. Lisa is a native of Cedar Rapids and completed a B.S. in biology at the the University of Iowa in 1988. While at Iowa, she became interested in ecological problems and started graduate work at Iowa State.

Lisa is studying the birds on several restored wetlands in north-central and northwestern Iowa. In particular, she has been trying to see how wetland size and the number of years since it was restored affect the species of birds that use the area. Most of Lisa's study areas are small wetlands located on private land near Clear Lake and near Estherville. In 1989 and 1990, she visited each wetland twice a week to search for nests and to keep track of nesting success. Later in the season, she studied that plants and the invertebrates in the water to see how those two factors affected the birds found on each wetland.

Lisa found a wide variety of marsh birds using the areas she studied. Although restored wetlands don't have the variety of the species that natural marshes have, the numbers increase as the vegetation on them gets better established. Although Red-winged and Yellowheaded blackbirds are the most typical species on restored wetlands, she also found Least Bittern, Sora, and Northern Shoveler. As with field studies, Lisa's work is dependent on the weather. The drought of 1989 meant that some of the marshes dried out that summer and had very low bird use. Still, her work provides valuable information to help us understand how wildlife will recolonize land that has been farmed for years.

Lisa plans to finish her master degree in spring 1991 and then hopes to find a job with a conservation agency where she can put her experience and education to work. Both the Iowa Nongame Wildlife Fund and the Max McGraw Wildlife Foundation have helped fund this research.

We are preparing a paper for *Iowa Bird Life* documenting the invasion of the House Finch into Iowa. We are especially interested in records of when the birds first reached an area of the state or when it first nested in a particular locale. ### People

Former IOU member **John Robinson** is the author of the recently published book "An Annotated Checklist of the Birds of Tennessee." John attended several IOU meetings while he was enrolled at Iowa State University in the early 1980s and also wrote several papers that were published in *Iowa Bird Life*. At IOU meetings, he showed an amazing ability to identify birds in photo quizzes and in the field. John worked for the Fish and Wildlife Service in Illinois and Tennessee for several years and now is a wildlife biologist for the U.S. Forest Service in Hayward, Wisconsin.

On October 4, 1990, Herb Dorow of Newton, long time IOU member and wildlife photographer, died of a heart attack. Gladys Black, in her weekly newspaper column, stated that "in the first 13 years of Red Rock Lake, Herb spent hours getting an early pictorial history of the area from the dam to Lake Avon of 8x10 black and white glossies also color slides, from the most common to the rarest accidental, land birds, waterbirds, shorebirds, gamebirds, song birds, hawks, owls, etc." Because of the quality of his work, his photos were widely published. Herb worked at Maytag for 22 years retiring in 1972. He was 81 at the time of his death.

This is an excellent facility for our annual spring meeting. Everything we need is on the grounds (even good birding areas).

In addition to the hotel and motel accommodations listed here, there are also sleeping quarters (dormitory style) on the park grounds. Overflow can stay in nearby cabins. The dormitory rooms are comfortable and sleep 44 people. Once these are full or if you would rather stay in one of the cabins, they will be assigned as needed. 
## Spring convention sponsored by the members of the Prairie Rapids Audubon Society
