

IOU Publications Committee Gets A New Look

In response to an IOU-wide initiative to address budget problems caused by rises in the costs of publishing, the IOU Publications Committee has undergone a reorganization.


Bob Cecil, Tom Johnson, Tom Kent and others have coordinated changes in the committee's membership, composition, and level of activity. The new committee consists of IBL editor Kay Niyo, newsletter editor Paul Hertzel, website editor Ann Johnson, past IBL editor Jim Dinsmore, and past IBL editor Tom Kent, chair.

Already, through a virtually continuous session by e-mail, the committee has drafted revised bylaws for governing itself and clarifying its duties, and developed a proposal for a balanced budget for 2003. New language in the bylaws would put editors of the IOU's primary publications as members of the committee for the duration of their editorships.

The IOU Publications Committee was created by action of the Board of Directors in 1985. Its bylaws appear in *Iowa Bird Life*, Volume 60, Number 1, where its various duties are listed, including responsibility to publish a quarterly journal and "other publications deemed desirable by the membership", to ensure the quality of the publications within the resources available, and to submit a prospective budget to the Board for the use of those resources.

Historically, the Publications Committee has not had a very direct role in these activites, preferring instead to delegate these responsibilities to the editors of the two regular publications. And, historically, this has worked well.

However, recently, production costs have risen, while the IOU membership has remained almost constant. In the last two years, the costs of producing the journal and this newsletter have exceeded the membership revenues. Since keeping these amounts in balance is supposed to be the responsibility of the Publications Committee, many felt it might be best to change the committee's *laissez faire* approach to management.



Brees Appointed to Records Committee

Aaron Brees of Corydon, Iowa, was appointed to the IOU Records Committee, replacing Matt Kenne, whose six-year term expired at the end of 2002. Aaron will serve from 2003-2008. Records committee members are chosen by the cur-

rent committee membership.



The records committee reviews documentations of birds classified casual or accidental in the state of Iowa, or birds classified regular that occur in unusual locations or at unusual times of the year. Current members are Ann Johnson, chair, Tom Kent, Jim Dinsmore, Jim Sinclair, Paul Hertzel, Lee Schoenewe, and Brees.



The IOU has been happy to give a year's membership in the organization to Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Little of Menlo, Iowa, who so graciously hosted quite a few birders into their home to see the Varied Thrush which visited their yard last December.




IOU Spring Meeting 2003

Hartman Reserve Nature Center, Cedar Falls, Iowa

The Spring 2003 Iowa Ornithologists' Union meeting will be held in the Waterloo, Cedar Falls area with programs and activities taking place at Hartman Reserve Nature Center (HRNC), located between Waterloo and Cedar Falls. Field trips are scheduled for both Saturday and Sunday morning and will be visiting several local areas including George Wyth Memorial State Park, Hartman Reserve Nature Center, Sweet Marsh Wildlife Management Area, Big Marsh Wildlife Management Area and the Cedar Valley Nature Trail. They will be led by members of the Prairie Rapids Audubon Society and others within the IOU who know the area well.



2002 Listing Totals

In visiting 92 of Iowa's 99 counties in 2002, Eloise Armstrong found 302 species of birds in Iowa, one more than her husband, and companion, Eugene. That extra bird was a Yellow-crowned Night Heron, seen at the Chariton River Greenbelt in Lucas County. They went looking for it "along the bayou with timber", said Eugene. "We split up, and when I got back she said 'Did you see the Night Heron? It flew right over me." He didn't see it.

302 species in a single year is just over 94% of the state's usual annual total of about 320 species. This is a remakable percentage, for any state. For instance, there were 342 species recorded in Minnesota in 2001*, with a top year list of 321 species, for 93.8% of that total.

Partners in Flight http://www.partnersinflight.org/

The Partners in Flight (PIF) program is a cooperative conservation effort involving governmental and nonprofit organizations, private industry, and private citizens. It was formed in 1990 with its original emphasis on woodland songbirds that winter in the neotropics. Since then it has expanded its focus to include a broad range of North American landbirds. This website provides basic information on PIF, its organization, and recent projects. Perhaps of most interest to Iowa birders are the regional conservation plans (flight plans) for 60 ecological regions in Cen-

tral and North America. Iowa is part of three PIF regions, namely:

Region #16 Upper Great Lakes Plain—northeastern corner of Iowa

Region #32 Dissected Till Plains—most of Iowa

Region #40 Northern Tallgrass Prairie—prairie pothole region of northcentral and northwestern Iowa

A synopsis of each plan and information on a few key bird species of each of the ecoregions is accessible from the website. You will need Adobe Reader or a similar program to download the full conservation plans. Each plan describes the region and its habitats, key bird species that are considered of conservation concern in that region, and plans for conserving or restoring important habitats. Iowa readers should find the information on this website useful in understanding conservation issues affecting Iowa birds.

Can anyone find Yellow Rails or Smith's Longspurs? Will the warblers drip from the trees of your favorite birding spot? What will be the wayward Accidental bird that casts a spell on listers? Ahhh, the magic of Spring!

Please send your Spring (March 1 to May 31) observations to me for compilation in Iowa Bird Life by 3 June if possible. Some guidelines that make the job of compilation easier are:

- Report the birds in 1998 checklist order, which is also available on Tom Kent's website at http://home.mchsi.com/~thkbirds.
- Report species, number, date, and location including county.

- Provide documentations of Casual or Accidental species for Records Committee review.
- Provide details of identification of species at unusual time (early or late migration date), or details of unusual behavior.
- Report the birds that are more noteworthy for your area. -Submit a report even if you have posted your observation on the IaBirds listserv. I save few reports posted to the listserv.
- If you send your report by US Mail, include an e-mail address if you have one. This makes it much easier to contact you if I have questions or need additional information.
- If you send your report by e-mail, include your report in the body of the e-mail, or send attachments in Word. I look forward to hearing from you!

An IOU Friend -Leonard Larson

Leonard Larson, longtime member of the Iowa Ornithologists Union passed away on December 21 of 2002. He gave a gift of \$5000 to the IOU. I called his brother Leslie and visited him in Farnhamville, Iowa to learn about Leonard. It seems he wanted to help many groups and had donations to his church, his American Legion, The National Wildlife Federation, The Bluebird Society and the IOU. Leslie also donated over 25 years of IOU journals and Bluebird magazines to our group along with 3 framed prints.

Leonard Larson of Farnhamville, Iowa was a member of the Iowa Ornithologists Union since 1976. He was born in Kerrington, North Dakota in 1914, and moved to Farnhamville at age 9 with his mother and family when his father died. He spent his entire life in this small northwest Iowa town except for WW II when he was part of the North African campaign with the 17th Supply Squadron. This was interesting to me because my father was part of this same campaign. His brother showed me a desk Leonard had made with wooden boxes sent from overseas to his mother. He was a carpenter and helped build over 44 homes in the area along with many other projects. He was a man of many hobbies but birds were special to him, especially bluebirds. He had over 40 bluebird houses in the area and monitored these since 1978. His brother showed me his record book and he was proud of every successful nesting. He belonged to the Bluebird Society also.

Among his other interests were the American Legion, metal detection, and he had an extensive barb wire collection. He was part of the Search Team after that fatal plane crash in Sioux City years ago. His barbwire collection was valued at over \$3000 and he donated this to the Rockwell City Historical museum.

I grew up in northwest Iowa and remember the scarcity of bluebirds. Many people like Leonard have helped to increase their numbers. When we see bluebirds in Calhoun County let us thank him for improving the beauty of the area.

New State Land To Benefit Songbirds

The Iowa DNR has acquired an 80acre tract of land that boarders the west side of the Cedar Creek Unit of Stephens State Forest, near Williamson.

Nearly all of the land is in timber and has important benefits to non-game wildlife, said Doug Harr, with the DNR's wildlife diversity program. "We thought it was pretty important to migrating and nesting songbirds," he said. "And as the hickories age, it has the potential to have nursery colony habitat for the Indiana bat, which is listed as a federally endangered species, so that was attractive to us."

The new property is only accessible through the existing Cedar Creek Unit. No vehicles will be allowed on the property.

The land was purchased through a federally appropriated state wildlife

grant and a matching donation from the National Wild Turkey Federation. It will be managed for the Kentucky warbler, Yellow-breasted Chat, Scarlet Tanger, Yellow Throated Vireo and other warblers, vireos and flycatchers.

"This purchase couldn't have been possible without the generous donation from the National Wild Turkey Federation," Harr said. "This should also provide an excellent opportunity to expand turkey and deer hunting in southeast Iowa."

The spring turkey hunting seasons, which runs from April 14 through May 18, will not conflict with the songbird nesting season, Harr said. The new property will be managed jointly by the wildlife and forestry bureaus.

The DNR acquired the property on Dec. 20 for \$28,000.

Jim Dinsmore Receives Olav Smedal Conservation Award

Jim Dinsmore has been named the 2002 recipient of the Olav Smedal Conservation Award. The award is sponsored by the Ames Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America and is presented to an individual or group located in central Iowa whose contribution to the public in the field of natural resource conservation or other outdoor pursuits reflects the highest standards

of ethics and sportsmanship. The selection committee is especially interested in recognizing those individuals or groups whose chief means of employment is work outside of the "conservation field". Consideration is given to the individual(s) who gives unselfishly of their free time and voluntary efforts.
