Atlas Awards Presented by Carol Thompson & Hank Zaletel

Awards were present at the IOU spring meeting held in Keosauqua for work done on the Breeding Bird Atlas Project. Out of a total 861 blocks, 717 were worked with 611 of them being completed. There were 507 participants working 14,654 people hours. The atlas committee and few paid atlasers (10 people) accounted for 41 % of the hours worked.

The afternoon program started with Jim Dinsmore discussing the "Distribution Patterns of Iowa Birds" followed by Tom Kent speaking on record keeping. The business meeting was held after the third presentation. Elections were held, a code of ethics was discussed, a treasurer's report was submitted, and the spring bird count was explained and discussed. The meeting adjourned at 5:10 p.m.

The evening program was presented by Eloise and Eugene Armstrong speaking on "Birding the Four Corners of Iowa," it followed the banquet of chicken, vegetables, potatoes and pie.

Carol Thompson made a presentation of awards to those individuals and groups who assisted in the Breeding Bird Atlas Project.

The following morning field trips returned to the same areas as Saturday morning. A picnic lunch was held at Lacey-Keosauqua State Park followed by the compilation of bird sightings led by Pete Petersen.

IOU Field Trip

Grammer Grove County Park Marshall County Saturday, September 18, 1993

Hawk Mountain, Cape May, Hawk Ridge....

These places are renowned for the variety and numbers of hawks which pass their way each fall. Now you can add Grammer Grove to the list. While this little spot in Marshall County can never compare to those veritable hot spots for hawk watching, the bluff over the Iowa River has for several years provided the Proescholdts and their friends with some pretty incredible hawk watching. For instance, on 29 September, 1990 sixty-one Sharp-shinned Hawks passed this area. Seven Cooper's Hawks were reported in 28 September, 189. An incredible 561 Red-tailed Hawks were counted on 11 September, 1991 with an additional 203 seen on 5 October of the same year. Add to that the occasional Peregrine Falcon, Merlin, Swainson's Hawk, etc., and you have the potential for an exciting day.

The woods in Grammer Grove have also produced some wonderful records of passerines over the years. Late September should still provide us with a delightful number of species.

Bring a sack lunch and a lawn chair to join in the fun. Hawk watching doesn't get very exciting until mid to late morning when the thermals are right, but the group will meet at the parking lot at 8:00 a.m. to check out the passerines. Come whenever you can and head northwest from the main parking lot to a large pine planting on the ridge.

To get to Grammer Grove, go north of Albion or south of Liscomb on County Road S75. Go west for just over a mile on either 125th or 130th Street. At Knapp Avenue you will turn north from 130th or south from 125th and continue to 127th Street. Go west on 127th Street to the park.

Research on Iowa Birds

Over the past five years, about 900 natural basins in Iowa that had been drained have been restored to their natural, wetland condition. Although conservationists are delighted to see these wetlands restored, little information is available to predict what bird species will use these areas and what factors are important in their use. Kristin VanRees, a graduate student at Iowa State University is currently trying to answer some of these questions. Kristin is studying birds on 24 restored wetlands in northwestern Iowa. These wetlands have been restored from 1-4 years so she can compare how rapidly various species occupy the wetlands after they are restored. She also is studying the insects and other invertebrates in these ponds to see how rapidly they colonize the wetlands. Since these animals are important food for the birds and their young, their presence may be important in determining what birds use the ponds.

Most of Kristin's study areas were originally drained about 50 years ago but as few as three years after they were restored, they supported an average of about five different nesting species of birds. These included ducks, Yellow-headed Blackbirds, rails, and grebes.

Kristin is a native of Des Moines where she attended Hoover High School. After a brief stay at a college in Colorado, she transferred to the University of Northern Iowa and graduated from there with a major in Biology in 1990. In the summer of 1990, she was a hack-site attendant for the release of Peregrine Falcons in Cedar Rapids. That fall she started graduate work at Iowa State. Kristin is an avid runner and outdoors enthusiast. She recently married Jeff Siewert and they live in Nevada. Jeff is also interested in birds of prey and when Kristin finishes her degree, she plans to take a break from school while Jeff attends graduate school.

Kristin's work was supported by a number of different organizations including the Aldo Leopold Center for Sustainable Agriculture, the Iowa Agriculture and Home Economics Experiment

Station, the Iowa Department of Natural Resources Nongame Fund, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Max McGraw Wildlife Foundation.


