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## NATURE'S INTERPRETERS

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It was just a short walk to the bridge. It couldn't have been more than 200 steps down the hill and into the woods.

But that was all it took for the Zaletels to tell another story and teacher another lesson. Hank Zaletel (and if you've ever met Hank you're not surprised by this) did most of the talking. Linda Zaletel (and if you've ever met Linda you're not surprised by this) did most of the teaching.

Just a few weeks ago, Hank said, he'd heard a woodcock climbing and diving over McFarland Park northeast of Ames. "Peet," the strutting, long-beaked bird called, "peet."

Don't know much about woodcocks? Linda suggested reading a description by Iowa-

born conservationist and thinker Aldo Leopold. Writing in "A Sand County Almanac," Leopold describes the mating flight of the male woodcock as a "sky dance."

The Zaletels have written a few words about birds, too. Hank helped write a booklet about all the birds that live in or fly over Story County. In it, you can learn some of the county's best spots for watching birds. You can also learn that the American coot is a regular here. Its spring migration generally peaks in just a few weeks.

Linda has written a guide to help teachers prepare lessons about birds. One lesson tells teachers about Iowa's state bird, the American goldfinch. Did you know the bird is known for building nests so thick and dense they can hold water?

Then there's' the annual Olav Smedal Award (Named after The Tribune's former outdoor writer and editor). It honors some of Story County's leading conservationists. The Zaletels now have their names on that, too.


### 'There to help'

Hank—who was born in Ames, grew up in Des Moines and went to Dowling High School
— is the librarian at the Iowa Department of

Transportation. He spends most of his lunch breaks at Hallett's Quarry looking for birds. That says more about his feelings for birds than his feelings for work.

At work he's in charge of journals, magazines, books, manuals, photos, files and clippings.







If somebody needs to know the name of Alaska's lieutenant governor, he knows where to look. If somebody needs help with a desktop publishing program, he hands over a manual. If somebody needs to know more about the Heart of Iowa Nature Trail, he finds the file.

"My greatest satisfaction is having somebody ask me something and I get the information," he said. "And then they say, 'Wow, that's exactly what I want."

"I'm there to help them."

He also tries to be there for the birds.

He joined Story County's chapter of Pheasants Forever. And it wasn't because he's a hunter. He's not. It was because the group works to protect pheasant habitat, which is also a good home for a lot of other birds.

Of all the conservation work he's down (and that includes working with Linda to produce a newsletter for Iowa's birdwatchers, volunteering to help with nature walks, working on the county bird book) he's proudest of a successful effort to protect wetlands east of Colo.

"Hank was one of the driving forces behind that," said James Dinsmore, a professor of animal ecology at Iowa State University. "He's just one of those people who gets an idea for a project and tackles it."

#### 'Sense of Wonder'

Linda Zaletel — who was born in St. Paul, Minn., grew up in Des Moines and went to Hoover High School —surrounds herself with owls. Visit her office at McFarland Park and dozens of owl eyes — from photos and posters and kid's artwork — are staring back at you.

Owls have been her favorites since she stared birdwatching decades ago. As a naturalist for Story County Conservation, she's shown live owls to thousands of schoolchildren.

And it really is thousands. The county's three naturalists see as many as 16,000 students

ever year. Linda wouldn't have it any other way.

"I like being a front-line interpreter," she said. "I like being with the kids. I like standing in a mud puddle or in a pond. I like watching children discover."

There is, she said, a certain "sense of wonder" when children learn about the outside world.

Jim Pease, Iowa State's extension wildlife specialist and an assistant professor of animal ecology, said Linda is the rare naturalist who hasn't lost passion for the work "after doing that thousandth snake program."

"She has maintained that ability to teach kids," he said. "She feels so strongly that it's critical for kids to have a positive outdoor experience."

But she's starting to do more and more of her conservation work indoors.

There's the bird curriculum she wrote. There's another bird curriculum she helped put together. There's the bird newsletter she and Hank produce. And now she's helping to decide which education projects win grants from the state's Resource Enhancement and Protection program.

### 'Getting something done'

Together, Hank and Linda (who have been married since 1972) are making a difference in our county.

"They get out and educate the public," said Mike Meetz, an assistant scientist at Iowa State's College of Veterinary Medicine. "There both do a lot of that."

So it's easy to find them attending a conservation meeting. Or presenting at conferences. Or writing a grant to support a new lesson plan about important Iowa conservationists. Or

recording bird sightings.

"Neither one has been afraid to say yes," said Steve Lekwa, the director of Story County Conservation. "You don't get one without getting both."

The Smedal Award is given annually. A



committee review nominations and selects a winner. Lekwa looked at the award plaque earlier this week and said, "I just feel real good about their names being on it."

The Zaletels, naturally enough, are happy to be award-winners. But that's not why

they do all they do.

"If we have a talent and we waste it, it's almost criminal," Hank said. "We're getting something done because nobody else will do it.



# 2000 IOU SPRING MEETING by Jane Clark, Clive

The IOU Spring Meeting was held May 19-21 at Camp Ewalu in Clayton County, just west of Strawberry Point near Backbone State Park. It was a lovely time of year to be visiting the many interesting areas in that part of the state.

On Friday evening, there was time for renewing acquaintances and sharing birding tales before heading to cabins and motels. Around the camp, Wood Thrushes, Rosebreasted Grosbeaks, and occasional warblers added to the first evening's enjoyment, and American Woodcocks and Barred Owls called through the night.

Early field trips on Saturday and Sunday included Backbone State Park, Bixby State Park, Fountain Springs, Joy Springs County Park. and Sweet Marsh. Some of the high points of the weekend included singing Veery at Backbone (at least a dozen throughout the park), Ovenbirds, Cape May Warbler, Blackburnian

Warbler, Ruby-throated Hummingbird on a nest, Blue-gray Gnatcatchers on the nest, an American Redstart nest, and many interesting wildflowers and plants along the path.

Excellent programs for the meeting included "Birds of Iowa's Restored Wetlands", by Jim Dinsmore, "Birds of Prey of Iowa", by Bruce Ehresman, and "Iowa, Portrait of the Land", by Larry Stone during the afternoon. The speaker for the evening program was Ann Barker - "A Touch of Antarctica: Expedition to South Georgia and the Falkland Islands".

Mark Proescholdt reported that the number of species seen during the weekend meeting was 149 species. Ninety-two people were registered for the meeting.


