1987 FALL MEETING Ann Barker, Secretary



The Fall meeting of the Iowa Ornithologists' Union was held November 13-15 at the Iowa 4H Camping Center near Luther, hosted by the Big Bluestem Audubon Society. Approximately 65 people were in attendance.

Friday evening's informal social gathering at the camping center included registration, refreshments, information on local birding areas, and a bird quiz. In addition, those present tackled a delightful "get acquainted" game which required finding individuals with qualifications such as:

- is retired
- has seen all three Scoters in Iowa
- is attending his/her first IOU meeting
- has a yard list of 50 or more species



The exercise indeed served its purpose well.

Saturday, following a hearty breakfast, field trips departed for the Saylorlorville area. One group headed first for the Big Creek owl roost area, where they were treated to a spectacular look at several Long-eared, Short-eared and Barred Owls. A Saw-whet Owl was also found nearby.


Back at the camping center, the following workshops were offered:

The business meeting followed the workshops. Minutes will be published in Iowa Bird Life.

Members re-convened at 6:00 for the banquet, followed by a film on "The Birds of Maynard Reece", featuring the Iowa artist at work in the wetlands and fields of the state. The results of the bird quiz were announced; the winner, identifying 19 out of 21 skins correctly, was Barb Wilson. In a tie for second place

were Darwin Koenig and Tom Kent, who each correctly identified 18 out of 21. From the Big Bluestem Audubon Society, Dave Edwards issued an official welcome to the IOU, with special thanks to Jim Dinsmore and Hank Zaletel.

On Sunday morning the Saylorville Lake area was again the focus of most birders, while a few covered the Camp Hantesa and Bays Branch Wildlife areas. During the morning, the lovely Indian summer deteriorated into rain showers which by noon were steady.

After a hot chili lunch, Bob Myers led the compilation of the bird list for Sunday and for the weekend. Seventy five species were seen on Sunday, with an additional 16 seen on Saturday only, for a grand total of 91. Highlights were: Common loons, Horned Grebe, White Pelican, Snow Goose, Black Scoter, Osprey, Northern Goshawk, Wild Turkey, Water Pipit, Northern and Loggerhead Shrikes, Yellow-rumped Warbler, and Snow Bunting. The "get acquainted" champion was Eloise Armstrong; tied for second were Carol Thompson and Beth Brown.

Our special thanks go to the Big Bluestem Audubon Society and its members Jim Dinsmore, Hank Zaletel, Dave and Jeanne Edwards, and Mike Meetz, who did an excellent job of planning and conducting a fine meeting. #### To the editors:

I would like to call your attention to a development which may be of interest. In recent years in the regions of the state in which cattle raising is a major factor many farmers now bale their hay into large round bales. It is difficult to put these bales in a barn or shed and in most cases the bales are hauled out of the field and placed in rows in a handy location. This is frequently along a highway from which they can be hauled out and fed even in a time of mud or snow.

In this part of the state I frequently see a Kestrel or Loggerhead Shrike in the vicinity on the lookout for the mice that are attracted to such a place that provides both food and cover for the rodents. If there is a utility wire or nearby tree on which the birds can perch that is all the better.

A trench silo provides a similar attraction to the rodents and to the birds that feed on them. Sometimes there is not even a trench, just a flat concrete apron with a row of big bales along each side with silage in the space between.

#### BREEDING BIRD ATLAS

Results from the 1987 field season are still coming in, but at the present time, 250 blocks have been worked in and 46 can be considered complete.

Computerization of the results has begun and information from about half of the field cards has been entered into the computer file. Once all of the information has been entered into the file, it will be much easier to report the results and provide updates. We will be looking at deficiencies in the covered blocks, in time of day birded, time of year birded, and expected birds. Where county coordinators exist, they are already doing this to assess their priorities.

In addition, we will be sponsoring four blockbusting weekends this year in the four corners of the state. Details of these expeditions will be published in the next newsletter, but plan on saving at least one weekend for blockbusting.

We will be sponsoring several contests to get everyone's competitive nature engaged. We will have several different categories for both individuals and clubs. Exciting prizes will be awarded.

We have started to discuss our publi-

cation format. We are also exploring several fundraising options to pay for the remaining data entry and for the publication of the book.

There are still many blocks (614) that have not been worked in as the project approaches its fourth year. Won't you consider helping on this important project?

#### BALD EAGLE DAYS

Bald Eagle Days will be held at Keokuk, Iowa January 22-24; followed by one at the Quad Cities February 6-7. The newest day will be in western Iowa at De-Soto National Wildlife Refuge, February 19-21.

Each of these sites is known for their winter concentrations of bald eagles. During cold winters, when all rivers and ponds to the north are frozen, Keokuk attracts 50 to several hundred eagles. They gather there to fish the open water created by the dam and to perch in the timber along the Mississippi River.

The Quad Cities also attracts from a dozen to a hundred eagles. They come to fish at the dam. From the parking lot of the Modern Woodmen, you can see eagles flying above the river, or perched at the island next to the dam.

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#### (BALD EAGLE DAYS cont.)

At DeSoto, the swift current of the Missouri River keeps many areas of the river open and fishable for eagles. They find shelter from the wind in the timbered areas which surround the river and ox-

bow areas. The eagles will also prey on waterfowl, particularly any crippled birds, which concentrate at De-Soto.

#### 1988 WINTER BIRD FEEDER SURVEY

#### SPONSORED BY THE IOWA ORNITHOLOGISTS UNION

#### AND THE IOWA DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES NONGAME PROGRAM

On two consecutive days during January 29-31, 1988, observe your feeder and using this form, describe your feeder and record the birds that visited you. In the space provided, list the <a href="https://highest.number">highest number</a> of each species that you saw together at any one time. For example, if you saw 10 juncoes at 9:00, 11 at 12:00 and 7 at 4:00, the number you should record is <a href="https://highest.number">11</a>. If males and females can be distinguished (cardinals, downy woodpecker etc.) record the combined total. For example, if you saw 3 male cardinals at 11:00 then 1 male and 2 females at 2:00, record 5 cardinals—the highest count for the males and the highest count for the females combined. Count only on the two consecutive days and record only the birds that you see at your feeder, under your feeder or in the trees around your feeder. Do not count birds which just flew past your house and did not use your feeder area. We want information only about birds influenced by your feeders. If you cannot get an exact count, record your best estimate. An honest estimate is far more useful than 'umpteen' or 'too many to count.' Mail the completed form to me by February 12, 1988:
