

Tri-State Convention, May 18-20, 1990


Fred Lesher, organizer of the meeting, left for China in August of 1989. The following is his status report on the convention to that point.

Smooth Sailing at the 1989 Fall Meeting Ann Barker, Princeton



The fall meeting of the Iowa Ornithologists' Union was held September 15 through 17, 1989, at the Presbyterian Camp on West Lake Okoboji. Eightyeight members and guests were hosted by IOU member Harold W. White, Estherville, a.k.a. "The Committee."

The Presbyterian Camp is located in a mature Oak woodland just south of the Iowa Lakeside Laboratory on the shore of the lake. Upon arrival, many checked out the cabins, where lower bunk space was at a premium. Having secured a spot for our sleeping bags, we headed for the informal orientation meeting in the main hall. Here there was an abundance of information about the area including bird list, maps, and field trip details, as well as sign-up sheets and a list of meeting registrants. All agreed that this "committee" was certainly well prepared. Field trip leaders gave previews of their trips while members enjoyed refreshments and lined up to challenge John Cecil to a game of ping pong.

After breakfast on Saturday, field trips departed to cover a good deal of northwest Iowa, with the following destinations:

- 1. Kettleson Hogsback, Cayler Prairie, Rush Lake and Jemmerson Slough, led by Doug Harr.
- 2. Spring Run, east side of Spirit Lake, Swan Lake, Christopherson Slough, and Anderson Prairie, led by Steve Dinsmore.
- 3. Ruthven area, Dan Greene Slough, Dewey's Pasture, and Trumbull Lake, led by Jim Dinsmore.
- 4. Ingham Lake, High Lake, West Swan Lake, Cheever Lake, and Four Mile Lake, led by Eugene Armstrong.

Field trip participants were blessed with ideal weather and very good birding,

and were heartened to find that wetland acreage in this part of the state is on the increase due to reclamation. The good variety of ducks, gulls, terns and shore-birds was probably typical of the prairie pothole region, and in addition, a generous sprinkling of migrating warblers and vireos was still in evidence.

Saturday afternoon's agenda was packed with top flight presentations, including:

- 1. "Birding the Iowa Great Lakes" with Jim and Steve Dinsmore and Hank Zaletel.
- 2. "Wood Duck Nest Box Program at Union Slough National Wildlife Refuge" with John Guthrie, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
- 3. "Wings Adaption to Flight" with Jim Dinsmore.
- 4. "Waterfowl Identification Techniques" with the IOU Records Committee, presented by Tom Kent, and including Bob Cecil, Ray Cummins, Steve Dinsmore, Pete Petersen, and Francis Moore.

The regular business meeting wrapped up the afternoon.

At 6 PM members boarded the Queen II at Arnolds Park for a "pelagic" cruise trip on West Lake Okoboji. A delicious picnic dinner was served, and the gull flock following in the wake grew steadily throughout the trip as popcorn chum was offered by thoughtful birders.

Back at the camp, the group gathered again in the main hall to hear our banquet speaker: outdoor writer for the Des Moines Register, photographer, and IOU member, Larry Stone. Larry's presentation was entitled: "Iowa, a Place to Conserve." It featured breathtakingly beautiful photography which detailed the amazing natural diversity of our state and its people. It evoked an emotional response in this reporter that won't soon be forgotten; we do indeed have fragile treasures of immense value in our state, and our quality of life is second to none.

Following the talk, Big Day committee chairmen Ray Cummins and Eugene Armstrong unveiled the two new handsome travelling trophies and announced the long-awaited results of the spring 1989 competition across the state (article to follow).

On Sunday, following breakfast, the field trips of Saturday morning were repeated, giving birders a chance to cover additional areas. Once again, the weather cooperated as did the birds.

At noon, under an oak canopy near the lakeshore, with an occasional Redbreasted Nuthatch tooting, a picnic lunch was served. Pete Petersen led the bird list compilation. 117 species were tallied for Sunday, with an additional 25 added from Friday or Saturday, bringing the grand total for the weekend to 142. Highlights were: Black-crown Night Heron, Northern Goshawk, Swainson's Hawk, Merlin, Baird's Sandpiper, Red-necked Phalarope, Water Pipit, Philadelphia Vireo, Cape May and Pine Warblers, Dickcissel, LeConte's Sparrow, and Pine Siskin. The most notable miss was, surprisingly, the Northern Cardinal.

Our special thanks go to host Harold White and his wife Sallie, who per-

sonally took care of every detail to assure Paullina: Horace & Mary Autenrieth, a superb meeting in every respect.



AND THE IOWA DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES NONGAME PROGRAM

On two consecutive days during January 25-28, 1990, observe your feeder and using this form, describe your feeder and record the birds that visited you. In the space provided, list the highest number of each species that you saw together at any one time. For example, if you saw 10 juncoes at 9:00, 11 at 12:00 and 7 at 4:00, the number you should record is 11. If males and females can be distinguished (cardinals, downy woodpecker etc.) record the combined total. For example, if you saw 3 male cardinals at 11:00 then 1 male and 2 females at 2:00, record 5 cardinals—the highest count for the males and the highest count for the females combined. Count only on the two consecutive days and record only the birds that you see at your feeder, under your feeder or in the trees around your feeder. Do not count birds which just flew past your house and did not use your feeders. If you cannot get an exact count, record your best estimate. An honest estimate is far more useful than 'umpteen' or 'too many to count.' Mail the completed form to me by February 12, 1990:

The atlas committee will be meeting in February to review this year's progress and to set our priorities for next year. PLEASE send in your cards now. Send cards even for those blocks that are only partially completed. We would also appreciate it if you would only send in updates and/or new information. This will make date entry much easier. Please check your records to see if any of your observations require special sightings or full documentation reports. If you have seen any of these species, please submit the supporting details.
